Dear Parents, extended whanau and children,

We are now nearly halfway through the 2021 school year and there is much to celebrate as we journey together as the Hato Patariki whanau, following in the footsteps of Jesus. As we pray, work, learn and grow together, we strive to be children of the light in which our school values of mana, aroha and pono are evident in our thoughts, words and actions.



Our integrated theme for this year is “What the World Needs Now”:

The purpose of this focus is to raise awareness of the innate human need to feel valued, accepted and loved. Our aim is to inspire individuals, classrooms and schools into action, thereby making a difference in the lives of others within local and global communities.

These are the key understandings based on the Principles of Catholic Social Teaching that children will become aware of:

- every person needs to feel cared for, that they are valued for who they are and that they have a part to play in society
- every person has an innate human dignity – te mana i te tangata – no one can take away
- being in solidarity is recognising others as our brothers and sisters and actively working for their good. In our connected humanity, we are invited to build relationships – whakawhānaunatanga – to understand what life is like for others who are different from us
- protecting those in need compels us to think first of the needs of those who are most vulnerable
- commitment to the common good means working for the good of all – he painga mā te katoa. This means respecting the rights and responsibilities of all people
- we each have something unique and important to contribute to society. We are called to be active members of our local and global communities

Let’s reflect on our journey together so far this year...

We have celebrated the following Masses together this year. We are blessed to have Fr Jaewoo lead us in these special occasions, where we encounter Christ in the celebration of the Eucharist.

- In Term 1 we celebrated the following Masses as a school: Our Opening Mass, St Patrick’s Day
- In Term 2 we have come together with our Buddy class to celebrate Mass.

16 people have been baptised this year and welcomed into St Patrick’s Parish. 25 people also received the Sacrament of First Reconciliation in May. These same 25 will receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Eucharist in August, to be celebrated by our Bishop, Michael Dooley.

This year we participated in the Caritas Challenge. Children enjoyed the challenge of living it, moving it, sweating it and stopping it, with a focus on Pacific nations to help raise money for those countries in the Pacific who are still facing ongoing hardships from the Covid Pandemic.

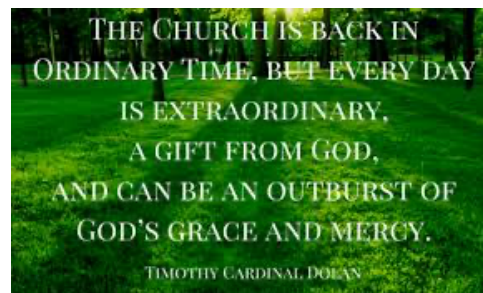
