


The Liturgical Year – we are currently in the season of Advent

Each year the Catholic Church invites us during Advent to take a step back and look at who we are, what we are doing, and where Jesus fits into our lives.

The Advent wreath is a visual reminder of this special season.

- The Advent wreath helps us to measure the time of waiting for Jesus to come.
- Each week we wait we light another candle on the Advent wreath to show us that the birth of Jesus is getting closer.
- The purple candles remind us that we are in a waiting time and the pink candle is the joy candle that shows us we have just one more week to wait for Jesus.
- When Advent is finished Christmas comes because on Christmas day we celebrate that Jesus is born. The Advent is wreath is not lit this day, as our waiting is over. You may have a white candle (the Christ candle) in the centre of your wreath, and this is lit on Christmas Day.

Sacramental Programme

Our Sacramental programme is an important part of the spiritual life at our school as we prepare the children for their ongoing faith journey.

The Sacraments remind us that we are a worldwide church. We all believe in God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, and in living like Jesus Christ by putting God's Word into practice.



It was lovely to prepare 14 Children and 2 parents for their Baptism this year. Baptism welcomes us into a family of people who believe in living as Jesus did. In Baptism we acknowledge the gift of the Holy Spirit in each of us. A gift given to us from God that guides, supports, strengthens and forms us into

people that are able to live joyful lives full of love.

22 children and 2 parents received the Sacraments of First Holy Communion and Confirmation in November. Confirmation asks us to use the gifts we have for others. We are asked to serve those around us and are guided in our actions by love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control.



Communion or Eucharist is a regular event that nourishes us to continue our personal growth and live in community. It is a time of gathering with others and acknowledging that none of us is perfect, but we are perfectly created. It is a time when we acknowledge the sacrifice that Jesus gave his life for us, while at the same

time we gather around a table, like the first apostles, and commit our lives to Jesus.
